Theme: *Teaching Exegesis at Historically Black Theological Schools (HBTS)* This session, co-sponsored by Wabash Center, will be focused on the findings from a Wabash Grant project entitled Teaching Exegesis in Historically Black Theological Schools (HBTS) awarded to Shaw University in 2007. The grant brought together Biblical Studies professors from the six HBTS for three conferences, to confer on the challenges of teaching exegesis in predominantly non-Eurocentric settings. It became clear that, with no HBTSs offering a PhD in biblical studies, all the HBTS professors were trained in predominantly Eurocentric settings and on Eurocentric approaches to biblical interpretation. However, their students are largely from the Black church, making it a challenge not only on the content taught, but also on the modes of instruction utilized.
