# **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

An examination of the Old Testament writings with attention to contemporary methods of Biblical criticism.

## **OUTCOMES/OBJECTIVES**

The student will develop a basic understanding of the Hebrew Bible (Old Testament) and will begin to comprehend some of the major issues, questions and problems faced in a post-modern study of the Hebrew Bible.

The student will develop a general understanding of the social, economic and cultural history of the people Of Israel as presented and interpreted in the narratives, the poetry and prophecy from the story of creation to the destruction of Jerusalem in 70 CE.

The student will learn to recognize some of the elements of the religion and piety of the people of Israel recorded in the Hebrew Bible through guided readings in texts of the Hebrew Bible.

The student will begin to understand Israel's place in the world of the Ancient Near East (ANE) through historical study and modern and post-modern literary and historical-critical methodologies.

The student will begin to critique some of the social, economic, literary and cultural origins of the Hebrew Bible and its content through the use of modern exegetical and hermeneutical tools.

The student will learn to experience the value of the Hebrew Bible as a record of God and Israel relating to one another within the context of 'human life' through exposure to the narratives, poetry, wisdom and prophetic literature of the Hebrew Bible.

The student will learn to appreciate how much common faith and trust is shared with Israel and her predecessors by

#### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

The student will read the assigned pages or texts in the Bible on the designated day for discussion. Please read the introductions to the various books of the Bible before reading the biblical book itself.

### THE STUDENT WILL HAVE ENTERED INTO THE DAILY DISCUSSION IN CLASS.

<u>The student will attend class regularly</u>—20% of the student's grade. THE GRADING SCALE IS AS FOLLOWS FOR ATTENDANCE: 0-2 ABSENCES=4.0; 3 ABSENCES=3.0; 4 ABSENCES=2.0; MORE THAN FOUR ABSENCES WITHOUT A LEGITIMATE EXCUSE=0.

Three ONE(1) page papers on the following topics: <u>PAPER #1</u>—Read Exodus 31:12-17; 20:8-11 and Deuteronomy 5:12-15 and answer the following questions: What is the point of each Passage? How do these passages compare and contrast with one another? [Due—Thursday 2/19/09]; <u>PAPER #2</u>—Read Jeremiah 31:31-34 and explain what the problems are that the prophet is addressing and to whom the prophecy is addressed [Due Thursday 4/09/09]; <u>PAPER #3</u>—Read Psalm 6 and label each of its form critical elements[Due—Thursday 4/30/09]. EACH PAPER IS TO BE TYPED OR WORD PROCESSED—<u>NO HAND WRITTEN PAPERS WILL BE ACCEPTED</u>-SINGLE SPACED, NO LARGER THAN 12 POINT TYPE, ON 8<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" X 11" PAPER, 1" MARGINS ON ALL FOUR SIDES; NO EXTRA LINES BETWEEN PARAGRAPHS. NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE MADE TO THIS FORMAT) <u>NO LATE PAPERS</u> <u>WILL BE ACCEPTED</u>. THESE PAPERS ARE <u>EACH</u> WORTH 20% OF THE STUDENT'S GRADE.

The student will complete and hand in <u>on time</u>—May 5, 2009 a comprehensive final exam worth 20% of the *student's grade*. (See above for formatting.)
