HOW TO READ A PROPHETIC BOOK

Between the poetic metaphors and the persuasive rhetoric, it may be hard to figure out what the prophets are saying. I have found that it is helpful to ask a simple series of questions whenever reading an oracle:

- 1. Determine whether this is an oracle of doom (predicting disaster) or an oracle of salvation (predicting restoration).
- 2. Identify any prophetic form that might be present. This might help determine if there is one or more oracles.
- 3. If this is an oracle of doom, ask:
 - Who is being condemned?
 - Why are they being condemned (i.e. what specifically have they done wrong)?
 - What's the form of the punishment (loss to an enemy, plague, drought, etc.)?
 - Will everyone be destroyed, or will there be a remnant who are saved? If there is a remnant, do they survive because they somehow deserve it, or are they just the lucky few?
- 4. If this is an oracle of salvation, similar questions can be asked: who is saved, when and why?
- 5. Finally, pay attention to the view of God, expanding his relationship to the nation. What metaphors are used for God: warrior, judge, etc.? Does God govern only one of the Jewish nations, all 12 tribes, all people, etc.?
