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Acknowledgments

The inspirations for this collection, of multiple kinds of bodies, are frankly too many to name. The contents to follow often acknowledge their intellectual, ethical, and spiritual debts, but here I endeavor foolishly to name at least some of the forces that helped us to deliver this book to you.

One of the theses of this collection is that queer forms of interpretation, analysis, expression, or simply use are reaching a tipping point, even a critical mass in biblical studies, and specifically within the study of Pauline epistles and interpretations. You can increasingly see this reflected in conferences, seminars, and symposia. Indeed, a majority of the fabulous essays to follow originated as conference papers at the Annual Meeting of the Society of the Biblical Literature, particularly in special themed sessions of the Paul and Politics and the LGBTI/Queer Hermeneutics units. Therefore, we owe a special note of thanks to the steering committees of both units and to the chairs in particular—Lynn Huber, David Tabb Stewart, and Diana Swancutt—who coorganized these sessions with me and then graciously allowed me to take the lead on editing this collection. Of course, such work is only possible when scholars are willing to innovate, to push and experiment, to extend themselves and the work that still predominantly disciplines approaches to Pauline epistles and interpretations. This is an understated description of the fabulous collection of colleagues whose work is represented in this book. As always, it is humbling to have colleagues trust you with their work, and I remain forever in your debt that each of you agreed to work with me on this collection and graciously accepted me as your editor and collaborator (often in multiple senses).

To be a little less than humble for a moment, though, I would venture to say that the best programs and sites of study in our fields are precisely those that make this work possible. The contributors to this volume come out of such programs and communities, and students and scholars would do well to pay attention to where cutting edge work is happening if they want to make such contributions to our world. The samples of scholarship gathered here are theoretically informed, ethically accountable, and politically reflexive for a reason. Beyond the circles of support and engagement that we have managed to carve out at otherwise disorienting and often dehumanizing meetings, it is important to note that a few of these essays began as papers in graduate seminars run by colleagues at Drew University, particularly Melanie Johnson-DeBaufre and Stephen D. Moore. Indeed, there are places where this work is not marginalized. Still, it is fair to say that several of us have experienced forms of marginalizationwe have been pushed around, but not exactly out. Given the conditions of academic labor in the early twenty-first century, I cannot help but think of colleagues who have stepped away, often because they have been pushed out. Many of them showed kindness, provided support, or simply inspired my work and the work of the contributors to this collection. At the moment, I am thinking of Holly Hearon, David Hester, Todd Penner, Lori Rowlett, and Holly Toensing, but because professionalization ostensibly forces a kind of forgetfulness, I know even these acknowledgments of debts are incomplete and inadequate. For now I call these up as one woeful gesture to point us toward all those bodies who have been marginalized, pushed around and down and out, within and beyond our guilds, and to articulate why interpretation should focus more on stigmatization, minoritization, exclusion, and normalization.

Semeia Studies has historically done its part in publishing scholarship in these directions; its catalogue remains an indispensible reading list for what biblical studies at its best is and still might be. It is an honor to add our voices to this series, and we cannot wait to see where else Semeia Studies might go. Many of the essays in this collection went in much better and clearer directions because of the constructive feedback provided by the series board. In that vein we owe an especially strong note of thanks to Denise Kimber Buell and the series editor Steed Davidson for their tireless yet incisive attention to these essays and the collection as a whole. This would not have happened without you, and you made my job as editor easier, minimizing any remaining faults or infelicities within the pages to follow. As always, it remains a pleasure to work with the entire team at SBL Press. Bob Buller, Heather McMurray, Nicole Tilford, Kathie Klein, and their team have once again capably shepherded this project through its final stages and into production.

But in closing I return to specifically acknowledging two groups of people to whom this collection is dedicated. First, this volume is dedicated to those committed scholars who contributed to this collection. It is easier to promote, celebrate, and sing the praises of a project when it involves such wonderful people and perspectives in creating these fabulous bodies. Second, this volume is dedicated to those bodies that are on the line in the use of these texts and traditions. It is no secret that people have done some of the worst things to each other while claiming to be following scriptural mandates, precedents, and examples, most especially (though not only) from Pauline epistles. It is my genuine hope that the kind of work done here and in other, interconnected settings show that we are more than on the verge, past the tipping point, and reaching a critical mass for transforming the conditions for such bodies, and learning how to name, resist, undo, and create alternatives to these dynamics.
