The 2012 meeting of the Pacific Coast Region of the Society of Biblical Literature will be held jointly with the Western Region of the American Academy of Religion and American Schools of Oriental Research on March 24-26, 2012 at Santa Clara University, in Santa Clara, California. Papers from established scholars are particularly encouraged.

SBL/PCR AWARDS

All participants are required to submit a paper to the appropriate unit chair by October 7, 2011. Faculty members are encouraged to nominate students or recent graduates with the understanding that the student or graduate must submit a paper for consideration.

Regional Scholar Award Program

Award: One prize of \$400 in one of the following areas: Hebrew Bible/History of Israel, or New Testament/Early Judaism or Qumran. The winner's paper will be submitted as the nominee to the national selection committee. The regional nominee is eligible for consideration to be one of the Regional Scholars.

Requirement: Submit paper to one of the program units by October 7, 2011. Designate the paper as "Submission for Regional Scholar Program." Send a copy of the paper and current CV to: Regional Coordinator, Mignon R. Jacobs by December 1, 2011.

Eligibility: SBL members who have earned a doctoral degree within the past four years or who is at the ABD stage of a doctoral program. Paper must be accepted to one of the program units for the 2012 regional meeting.

Criteria for evaluation:

Paper: Demonstrated *knowledge of scholarly resources and publications* related to the topic of the paper

Use and knowledge of the primary sources related to the topic of the paper

Clarity of written expression

Use of scholarly practices of annotation

Originality of ideas and solutions developed in the paper

Presentation—Communication skills, ability to interact with the audience, appropriate use of visual aids, etc.

Regional Nominee will be announced following the regional conference (by May 10, 2012).

Student Essay Award

Award: One prize of \$250 in one of the following areas: Hebrew Bible/History of Israel, or New Testament/Early Judaism, Qumran

Requirement: Paper must be submitted to one of the program units by October 7, 2011 and designated as a "Student Essay Prize Submission." Professors wishing to nominate doctoral or master's students may submit papers via email to the Regional Coordinator, Mignon R. Jacobs by December 1, 2011.

Eligibility: SBL member. Papers accepted to one of the program units for presentation at the 2011.

Criteria for evaluation:

Paper: Demonstrated *knowledge of scholarly resources and publications* related to the topic of the paper

Use and knowledge of the primary sources related to the topic of the paper

Clarity of written expression

Use of scholarly practices of annotation

Originality of ideas and solutions developed in the paper

Presentation—Communication skills, ability to interact with the audience, use of visual aids, etc

Ineligibility for Award: The same paper submitted for both awards; the same paper submitted more than once for any award. An individual submitting multiple papers for consideration within the same program year.
