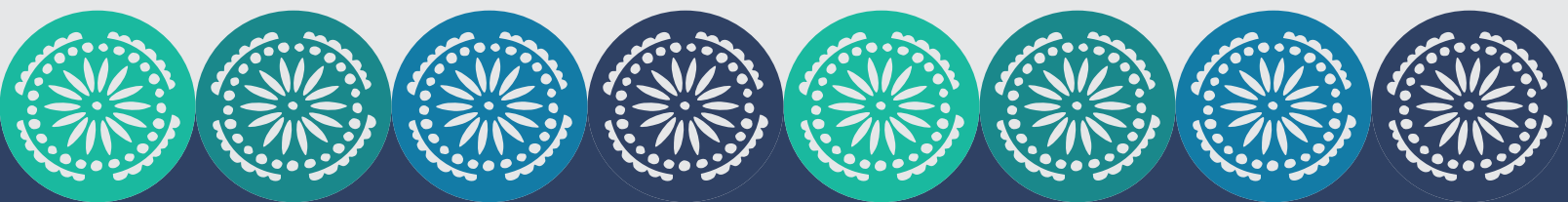

GETTING TO THE MEETING...

The **Annual Meetings 2023**, hosted by AAR & SBL, brings together professors and students, authors and publishers, religious leaders and interested laypersons, to its venue each year. Co-hosted by the American Academy of Religion and the Society of Biblical Literature, the Annual Meetings focuses on the fields of biblical scholarship and research, religious studies, and theology.

Attendees of the **Annual Meetings in San Antonio** will have access to more than 1000 academic sessions and workshops. In addition, attendees will have access to the Book Exhibit Hall which features one of the world's largest collections of books and digital resources for religious studies, biblical studies, theology, and more as well as a vibrant networking space where attendees can present ideas to publishers, browse the latest publications, and connect with colleagues.

INTERNATIONAL ATTENDEES

It is necessary for those entering the United States to clear customs and immigration. Visitors from Canada and Mexico must present a passport in order to enter the United States. Visitors from the 38 countries that are part of the Visa Waiver Program must have an e-Passport (embedded with an electronic chip) in order to skip the visa process. Please be prepared. Non-U.S. citizens should inquire about possible visa requirements from their own country. Official letters of invitation to the Annual Meetings to support visa applications are available. Please indicate during registration in the "Letter of Invitation" portion if you would like to request a letter. If you have questions, you may e-mail reg@aarweb.org or annualmeeting@sbl-site.org after you have completed registration to obtain more details about the information required.

Please note that AAR and SBL will fully refund registration fees with no penalty to all members in good standing whose visa applications are denied or who are otherwise restricted from entering the United States. For full refund, members must provide a copy of the visa rejection or other written proof of travel restriction.

GETTING AROUND SAN ANTONIO

There are no airport shuttles to the San Antonio Riverwalk area hotels. San Antonio offers various ground transportation options from the San Antonio Airport to the downtown area. For all things San Antonio International Airport including ground transportation visit flightsanantonio.com.

Taxis

Taxi service is available throughout the city. From San Antonio International Airport to most downtown hotels, current fares are approximately \$30-\$40, one way. A cab or taxi can put you in the heart of the city in about 25 minutes.

Shared-Ride Service (such as Uber or Lyft)

The following rideshare service companies are approved for operations at SAT: Uber, Lyft, Wingz, Wridz. Approved rideshare services (or ride-hailing or ride-booking service companies) meet customers on the outer commercial curbside, lower level of Terminal A. The average fare to downtown is \$25, not including peak surcharges.

HOTEL ACCOMMODATIONS

AAR and SBL have negotiated special group rates at seven hotels, all within walking distance to the Henry B. Gonzalez Convention Center.

You can get the discounted group rate only by reserving your room during the online registration process, and you must be registered to secure housing. Be sure to follow the instructions carefully and provide all requested information. Special rates will not be available after October 17, 2023. Please do not contact the hotel directly before November 10, 2023 as they will not have your information. Hotel room rates do not include the average of 16.75 percent hotel room tax.

Hotel reservations are available from Thursday, November 16, through Tuesday, November 21, 2023.

HOUSING CONFIRMATION

You will receive an email confirmation (which is the same as your registration confirmation) when you make your hotel reservation with the AAR and SBL Housing Department. If you do not complete registration with payment and receive a confirmation email, your housing reservation is not complete. If you receive an email confirmation that is incorrect, you may use the link on your confirmation email to go back into the system and correct it.

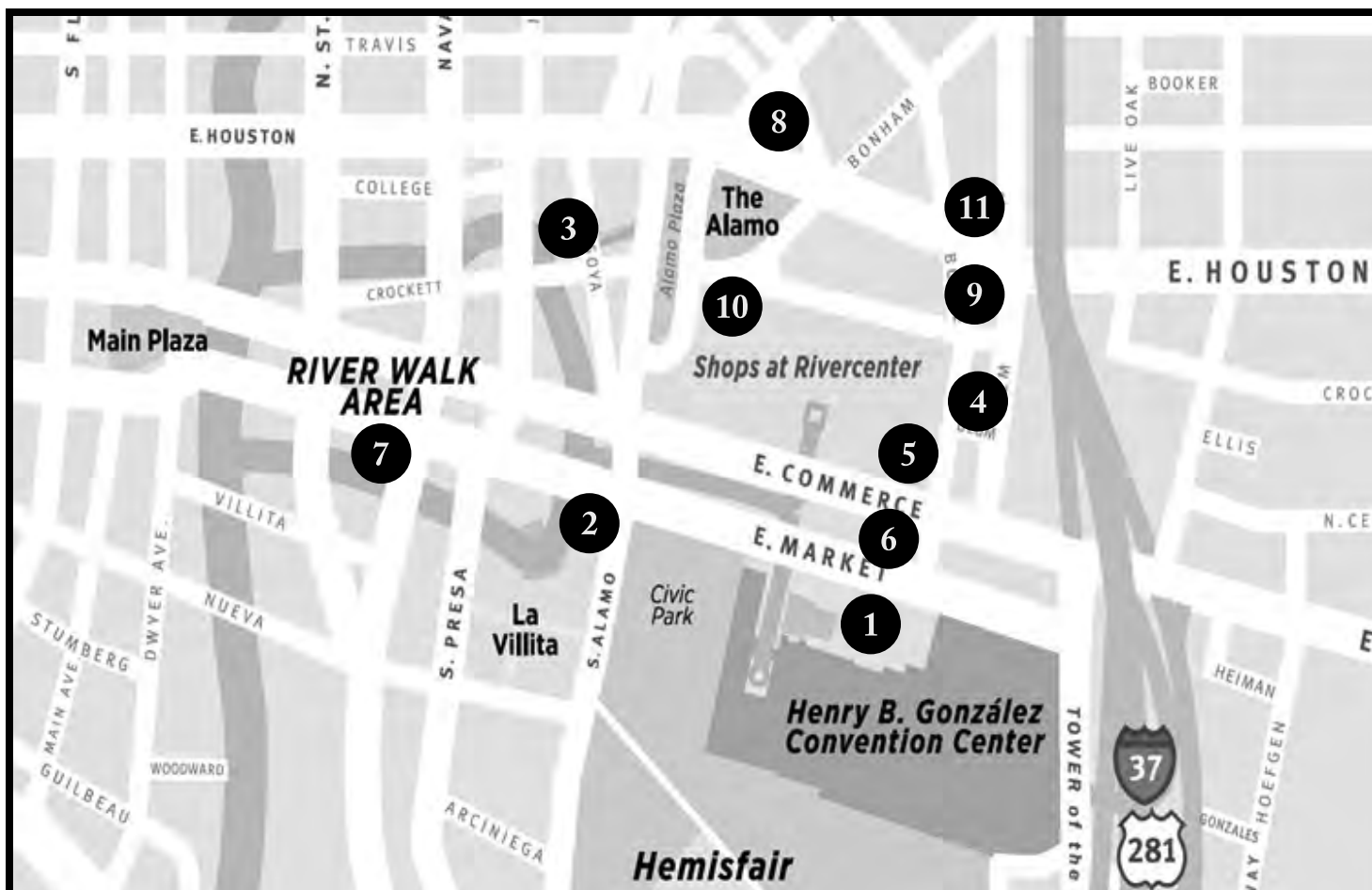
WHEELCHAIR OR ELECTRIC SCOOTER RENTAL

TOUR AND VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY WITH PRIMARILY PRIMATES

Friday, November 17, 1:30 PM–5:30 PM; Cost: \$60



Primarily Primates was founded in 1978, making it the first primate sanctuary in North America and the first to rescue chimpanzees requiring lifetime care following medical research. PPI's devoted staff supports all dimensions of

animal life from diet to medical care to social-behavior management. Staff perform daily animal assessments, including behavior & physical checkups, for illness prevention and social-behavior management. What we will do: Primarily Primates does not offer tours to the public. However, they offer opportunities for visitors to volunteer with them, and a tour will be provided as part of the volunteer work. What to wear and bring: Please wear good walking shoes and comfortable clothes that you do not mind getting dirty. The terrain we will be walking on is rocky, so a golf cart will be available for those who cannot walk long distances. Our hosts also recommend that we bring sunscreen and insect repellent, since November in San Antonio can be warm, sunny, and buggy.

From the historic block where San Antonio began to the crown jewel of its skyline, join us for "a few of our favorite things" that exemplify the city's unique character. One of San Antonio's oldest and most regal neighborhoods allows a glimpse into the fascinating twists and turns of people and social issues throughout the city's history. CRUISING AND EXPLORING LAND AND WATER TOUR

What are the two most popular attractions in San Antonio? The Alamo and Riverbarge Rides, of course! Our first stop is the famous Alamo, established in 1718 and originally known as Mission San Antonio de Valero. Guests will see remains of

original structures, including the chapel, which is now a shrine to the fallen Alamo heroes. Next, enjoy a barge ride along the beautiful San Antonio Riverwalk while your barge captain, who is really a local historian, points out fun facts about culture and architecture.

HAUNTED SAN ANTONIO WALKING TOUR

Sunday, November 19, 3:00 PM–5:00 PM; Cost: \$38



Join us on an exhilarating tour as we walk the oldest parts of San Antonio, visiting some of the haunted places in our city. We will explore where famous people, battles, and ghosts are said to appear. We will tell the stories of The Alamo, the Spanish

Governor's Mansion, The Menger Hotel - the most haunted hotel in Texas, and the Old Bexar County Jail. Murder, suicides, the ghosts of famous people, battles, and more are covered in this Haunted History Walk.

SACRED SITES TOUR

Monday, November 20, 1:00 PM–5:00 PM; Cost: \$40

First settled by Europeans in 1718, San Antonio is named for Saint Anthony of Padua. It became one of the largest cities in Texas after the Civil War. This tour will explore some of the houses of worship this rich heritage has bequeathed it. Possible stops will include San Fernando Cathedral (dating from 1738 with a major expansion in 1868), the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Little Flower [begun shortly after the canonization of the St. Tèreise de Lisieux ("the Little Flower") in 1925, Temple Beth-El (a Reform Jewish congregation founded in 1874 that erected its current landmark building in 1927), and St. Paul's Episcopal Church founded in the Government Hill neighborhood in 1883 adjacent to Fort Sam Houston. Transportation will be provided by bus.



The Sacred Sites Tour will be led by David Bains, Samford University and Daniel Sack, Washington, DC.

AAR and SBL foster not only excellence in the study of religion and biblical scholarship, but also environmental stewardship.

CARBON OFFSET PROGRAM



AAR and SBL are making it easy for members to purchase certified carbon offsets through the AAR and SBL Annual Meeting. By

simply clicking a box during the registration process, members can choose to address their emissions by supporting renewable energy projects in the United States through a \$16 carbon offset fee.

AAR and SBL selected *NativeEnergy* because of its commitment to reducing greenhouse gases, while also driving community level social and economic co-benefits through their carbon reduction projects. *NativeEnergy* helps assist Native American, farmer- owned, community-based renewable energy projects that create social, economic, and environmental benefits. These projects displace electricity from fossil fuels and reduce other greenhouse gas emissions. Your support helps bring these impactful projects to life!

CONVENTION CENTER GREEN INITIATIVES

The Henry B. Gonzalez Convention Center (HBGCC) was awarded LEED Silver Certification in August 2017 for building design and building operation in the New Construction LEED Certification category. Points were assigned for sustainable site development, water efficiencies, energy and atmosphere, materials and resources, and indoor environmental qualities.

The Henry B. Gonzalez Convention Center is committed to sustainable practices and being the best stewards possible with our resources. Our current initiatives include the following:

Waste Management

The CCC's comprehensive waste management program focuses on identifying, reducing and diverting the various waste streams created by venue operations, attendees and clients. Components of this plan include a facility waste audit, as well as methods to reduce the amount of waste being created, manage inevitable waste and divert waste from landfills by means of reuse, repurposing, recycling and composting. Each year these efforts result in diverting nearly 50 percent of the waste produced from the landfill.



☞ The HBGCC has been diverting various materials since 2006. Materials diverted include:

- Cardboard
- Polyurethane foam (carpet padding)
- Scrap metal
- Paper
- Glass
- Plastics
- Aluminum

☞ Our facilities use comingle recycling compactors to divert waste from landfills.

☞ From July 2009 to March 2022 the total tonnage diverted from landfills exceeded 1813 tons.

☞ Other items recycled by our business partners include telephones, cables and wires. Dishwashers are used for glassware for head table water service.

☞ Bottle filling stations are located within the building.

Energy Conservation

☞ Convention Center staff practice stringent energy conservation and abide by the City's energy conservation policy. Lights, air conditioning, and escalators are kept at reduced or off settings when areas of the building are not in use.

☞ The upgraded Building Control System allows for better scheduling of building systems.

☞ Improved energy efficiencies include:

- Upgraded lighting fixtures and ballasts
- Solar Thermal window film
- Improved HVAC components and control systems

☞ 100% of lighting in the expansion is energy efficient.

☞ 100% of restroom faucets, soap dispensers and paper towel dispensers are battery free.

Water Conservation

☞ Low Flow touchless automatic faucets and dual flush valves are installed in all restrooms

☞ Drought tolerant plants are used around the Convention Center

☞ 100% of faucets, commodes, and urinals are low flow

Green Purchasing

- ☞ Bags used for recycled items are made from 100% recyclable material
- ☞ 100% biodegradable bags are used for garbage
- ☞ The majority of office supplies, custodial products, and cleaning supplies are eco-conscious; recycled copy paper is used
- ☞ Green cleaning chemicals are biodegradable, nontoxic, eco-friendly, and non-corroding

Other Practices

- ☞ City of San Antonio Bike Sharing Stations are located near the Convention Center.
- ☞ The Convention Center has a two-bin system throughout the facility:
 - There are over 265 sets of waste collection bins
 - All receptacle used to collect recycling are clear in color and comprised of 100% recyclable materials
 - All receptacles used to collect trash are green in color, comprised of 50% recyclable material and are 100% biodegradable
- ☞ The RK Culinary Group, our catering company, also contributes to our sustainability efforts:
 - As part of our expansion, the RK Group installed 2 Eco-Safe Digesters which use a high refined formula of microorganisms to decompose carbon-based food waste into a non-toxic liquid that is safely disposed into standard wastewater disposal systems
 - Disposables — as often as possible, disposable cups are replaced with reusable mugs and/or eco-friendly products. Disposable cutlery has been replaced with reusable silverware and/or cornstarch compostable items. Napkins have been replaced with cloth napkins and/or 100% recycled paper napkins
 - Coffee Filters — commercial coffee brewers are used that do not require filters. Liquid concentrate coffee is used, and aluminum containers are recycled
 - Food Donations — any prepared food not served from convention meals (within established guidelines) is donated to local food banks for distribution to those less fortunate. Food donations are provided to Daily Bread Ministries and the San Antonio Food Bank, with an average of 1000 meals per month. Since January 2021 our in-house catering partners have donated **10,432 lbs.** of food to our local charities and organizations.

- ☞ The Convention Center will provide waste audits for specific events — debris and recyclable materials will be gathered and weighted, and a total provided at the end of the event
- ☞ The Convention Center continues to work towards reducing our carbon footprint by improving our recycling efforts during move-outs with client approval

Food and Beverage

PROGRAM BOOK



Paper used in the *Program Book* is certified by the globally-recognized Sustainable Forest Initiative, which ensures that wood and paper products are from well-managed forests and is backed by a rigorous third party certification audit. Use of recycled paper equates to a 40 percent reduction in energy versus paper made with unrecycled pulp.

OPT-OUT OPTION

AAR and SBL offered registrants the choice to opt-out of receiving a *Program Book* in the mail or of having a *Program Book* printed for them.

- ☞ Maps of the Annual Meetings hotels

- ☞ Access to supplementary materials uploaded by presenters like handouts and full-text papers.



Attendees will be able to create and customize their own schedule, make notes about sessions, and share information and their schedule with colleagues and friends via built-in social networking. BEST PRACTICES FOR SOCIAL MEDIA USE AT THE 2023 ANNUAL MEETING

AAR and SBL promote the academic study of religion and sacred texts across many channels: print, online, and the Annual Meeting. Social media outlets, especially “livetweeting,” can be an important means for continuing the conversation beyond the audience of an Annual Meeting session. These guidelines are intended to craft a forum that encourages an open discussion while maintaining the integrity of the scholar’s work.

1. Attendees are encouraged to live-tweet at the Annual Meeting using the official 2023 Annual Meeting hashtag (**#aarsbl23**).
2. Program unit chairs are invited to create hash tags for their units.
3. **Do not presume consent, and respect others’ preferences.** Presenters may request that their presentation not be broadcast across social media. Similar to a presenter’s requests not to be filmed or recorded, attendees are asked to respect the presenters’ wishes.
4. Attribution is key. List the speaker’s name and presentation title; refer to a social media handle, if known.
5. Clearly define where the idea originated. Note direct quotes within quotation marks. Make it clear when you are summarizing an argument and when you respond with your own opinion or interpretation of it. Note when the presentation is over.
6. Be respectful, even if you disagree.
7. Keep the dialogue going—bring responses from social media into the meeting session (e.g., ask questions posed to the author from the Twittersphere) and remember to use the meeting hashtag (**#aarsbl23**) so you can see who is responding to the same session you are.

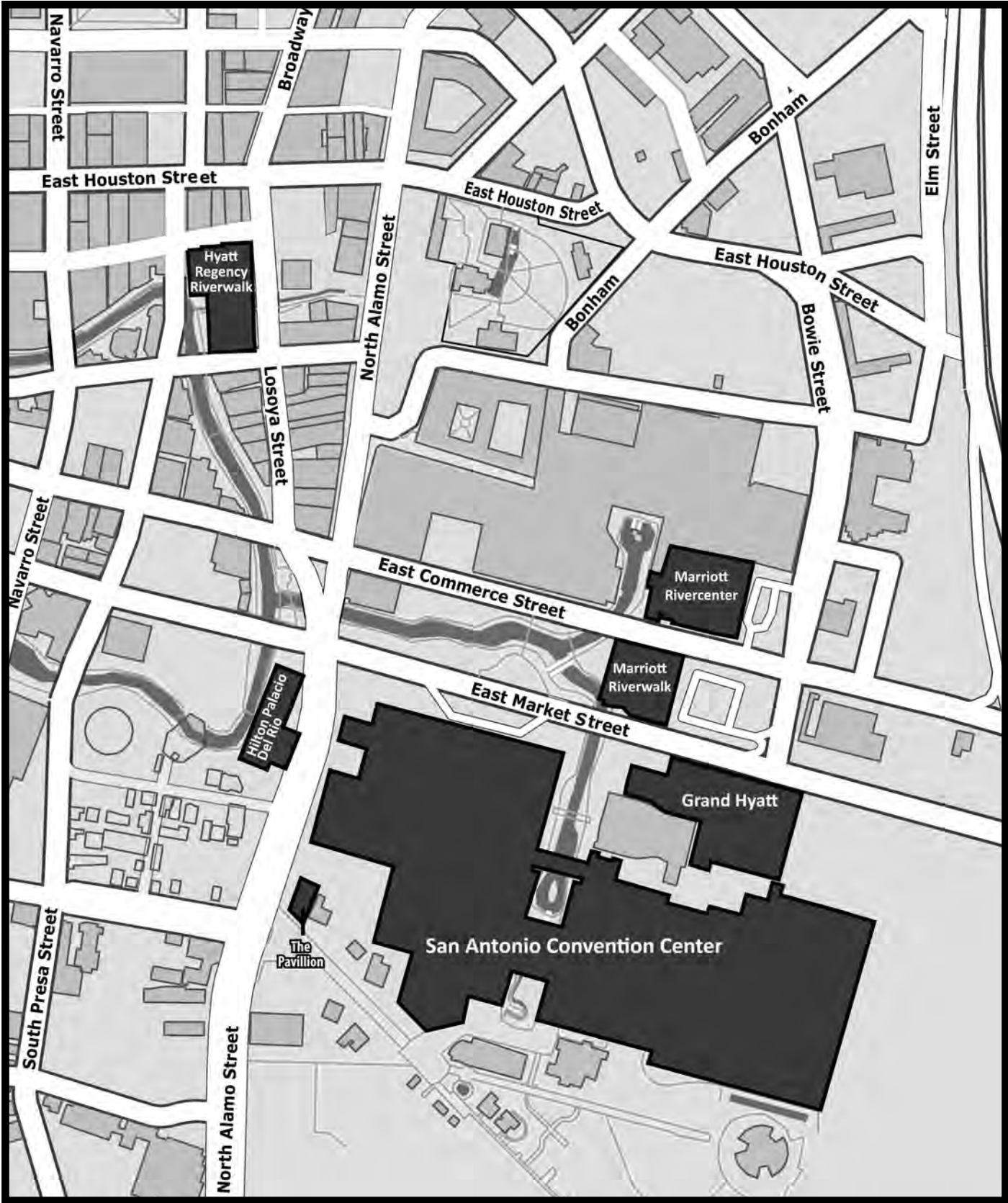

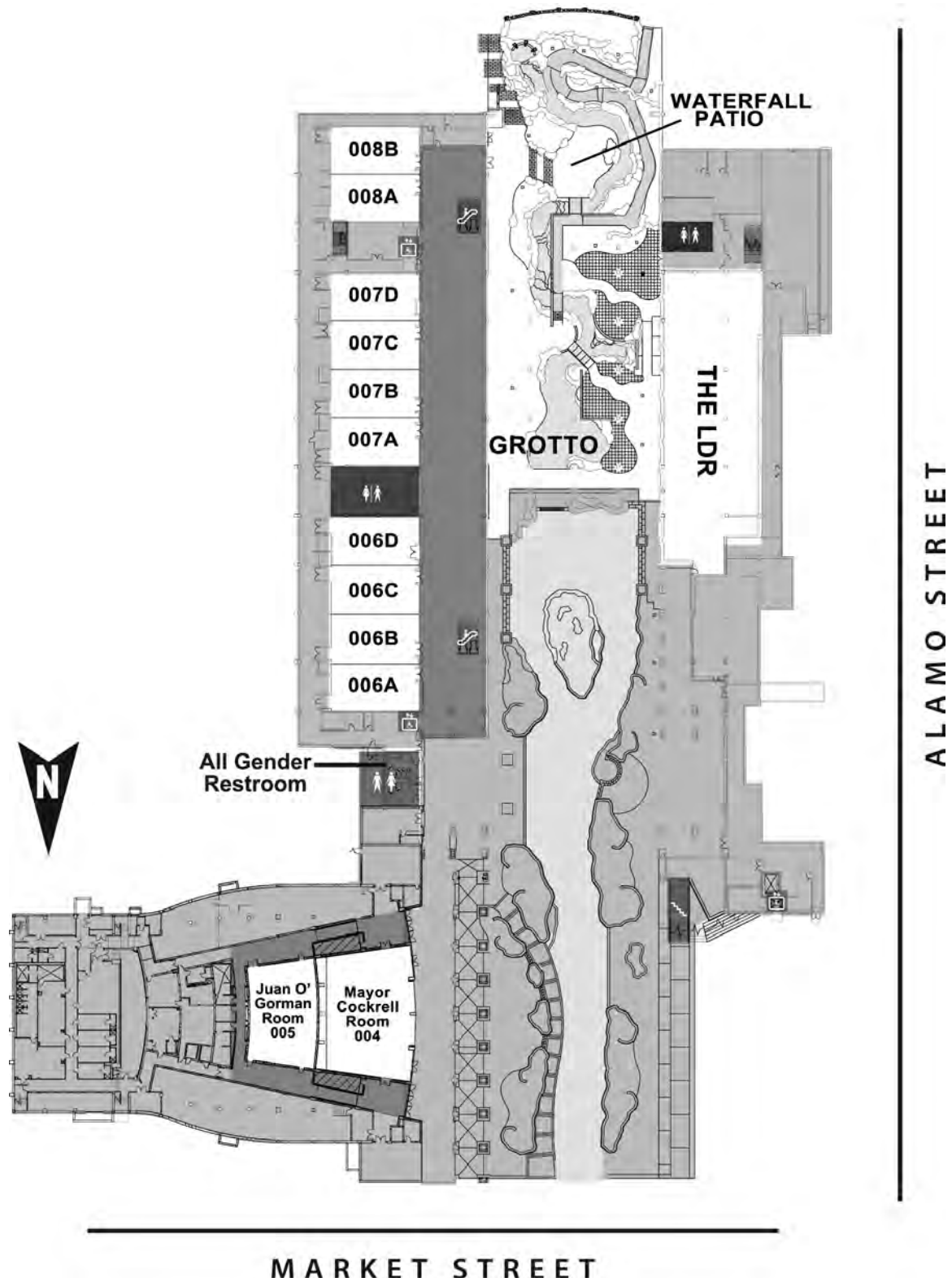

CONVENTION FOOTPRINT MAP



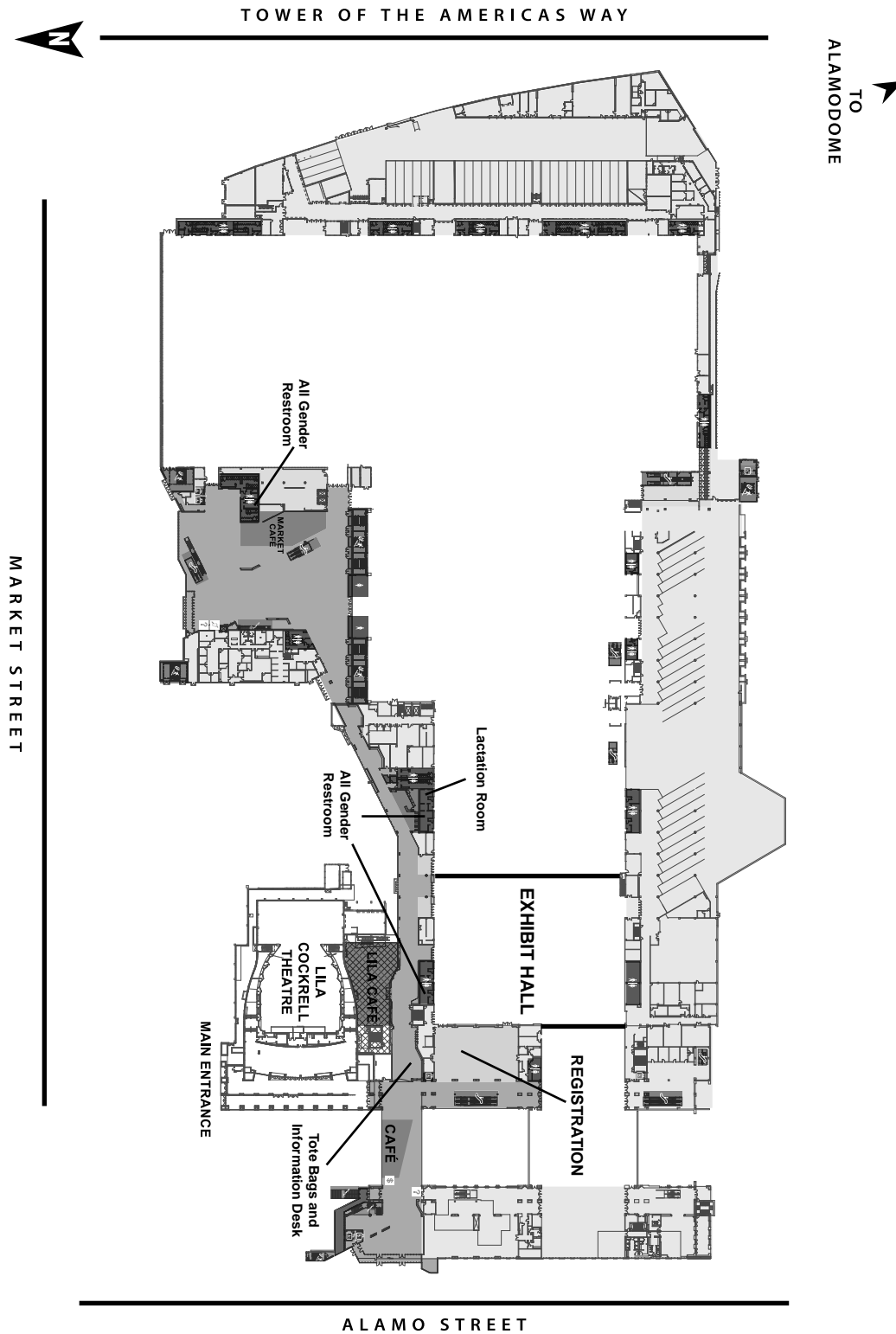

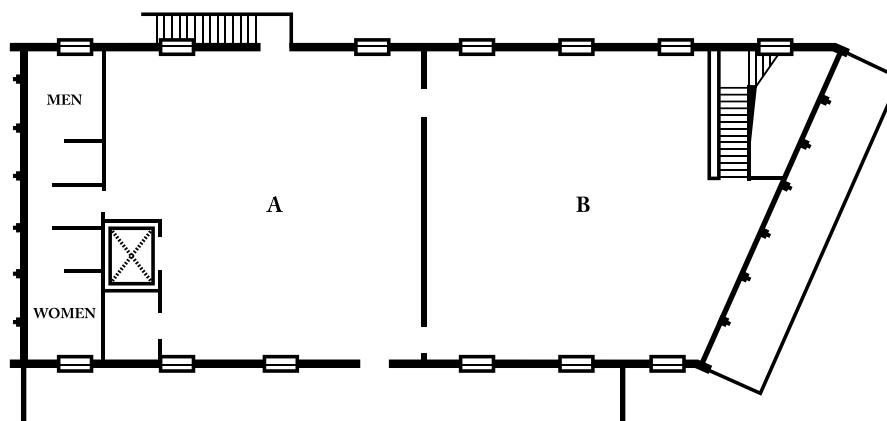

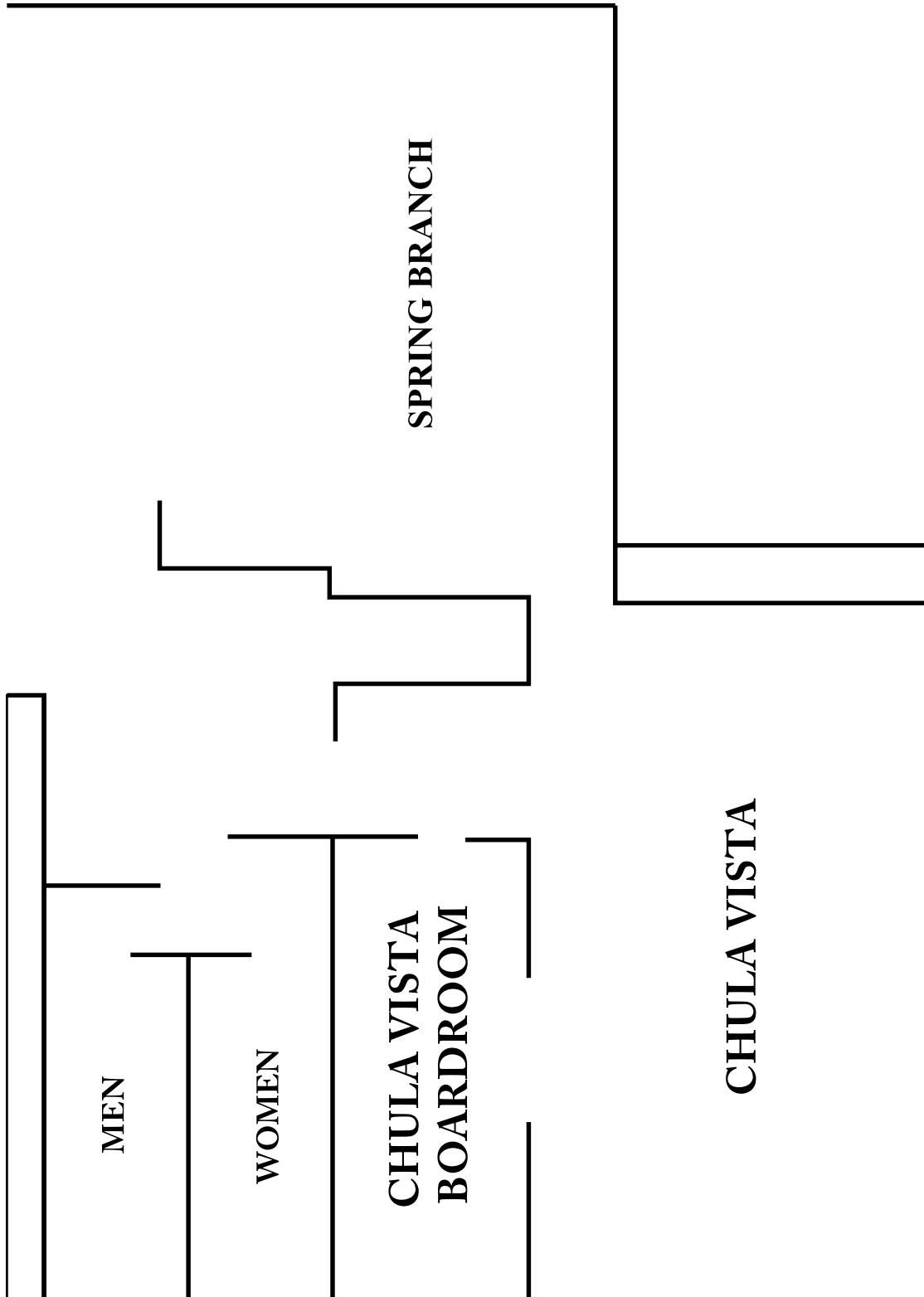

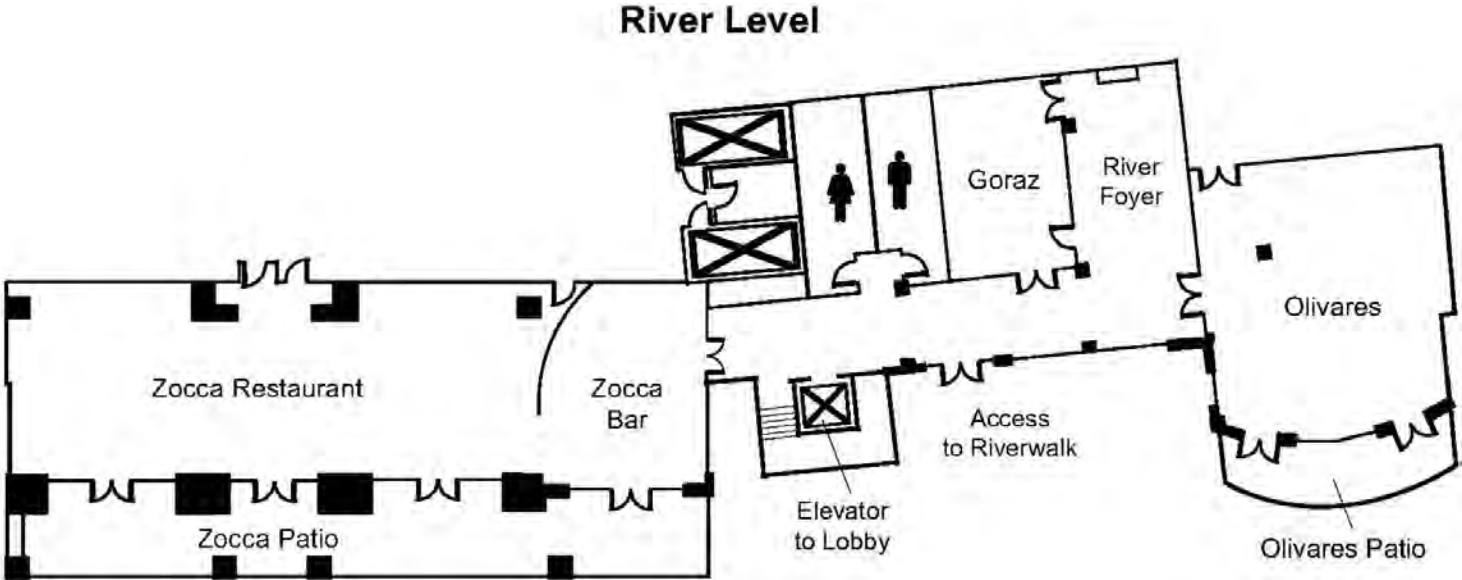

I have worked for over 25 years in Los Angeles, and this presidential address will be delivered in San Antonio. In both cities, Spanish is the dominant language, but often isn't recognized as such. I will say a few things about the study of Islam in particular, but also connect that more generally to the work that we do in the study of religion, and think more broadly about what is the work of our hands when we do the study of religion. Part of this

involves looking at both the study of religion and at theology, and the conflict dualism that is often set up between the two. I will also talk about some insights from religion and music that are important here. I will also discuss the actual work that we do as scholars of religion, which often isn't the production of scholarly monographs that are sometimes only read by a handful of people, but work that affects thousands.

Another works at the intersections of philosophy, theology, and psychology as a dean at a school of education. A third provides critical scholarly research on American Muslims, while the fourth directs programs in religion at an international nonprofit organization. 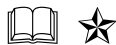

Ian Reader and George Tanabe's *Practically Religious* (University of Hawai'i Press, 1998) was a groundbreaking work that continues to influence scholars today. While not explicitly written in conversation with scholars in the nascent field of Lived Religion at the time, it was perhaps one of the first and most influential works on what later became known as the study of lived religion in Japan. The book highlights the categories of moral luck and good luck, the marketing of benefits, the confluence between high and low traditions, and the distinction between cognitive and affective belief. Appealing to textual scholars, ethnographers, Buddhologists, and many others, it continues to be cited in contemporary research and is a staple assignment in many courses. In celebration of this seminal work's 25th anniversary, the Society for the Study of Japanese Religions (SSJR) will host a roundtable of scholars who have benefited from the book.

People without data are not people. Therefore, there is an urgency to survey and collect data to identify and locate Asian Americans. When there is no quantifiable data other than relying on anecdotal observations, it is impossible to chart the history and trends of Asian American Christianity and confront emerging challenges. By 2065 Asian Americans are projected to be the largest minority group in the US. Yet:

- There are no organizations studying Asian American Christians in an evidence-based systematic fashion.
- There are no foundations and well-established funding groups that study Asian American Christians.
- The only group supporting Asian American religion research is one organization studying Muslim Americans, almost half of whom are Asian.

SOCIETY INFORMATION

The mission of the Society of Biblical Literature is to foster biblical scholarship. This mission is accomplished through seven strategic goals:

- ✎ Collaborate with educational institutions and other appropriate organizations to support biblical scholarship and teaching
- ✎ Develop resources for diverse audiences, including students, religious communities and the general public
- ✎ Encourage study of biblical literature and its cultural contexts
- ✎ Facilitate broad and open discussion from a variety of perspectives
- ✎ Offer members opportunities for mutual support, intellectual growth, and professional development as teachers and scholars
- ✎ Organize congresses for scholarly exchange
- ✎ Publish biblical scholarship

These strategic goals are, in turn, pursued through a number of SBL programs and initiatives under the leadership of SBL volunteers and staff.

PROGRAMS AND INITIATIVES

Congresses

The Society’s meetings bring together scholars from around the world to foster biblical scholarship by:

- ✎ showcasing the latest in biblical research
- ✎ fostering collegial contacts
- ✎ advancing research
- ✎ highlighting a wide range of professional issues

Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting, held yearly in North America, is the largest international gathering of biblical scholars in the world. Each meeting highlights the study of the Bible, archaeology, related languages and literatures, theology, religion, and contemporary issues such as the Bible in American public education. The Annual Meeting also features the world’s largest exhibit of books and digital resources for biblical studies—all of which are also for sale at this congress. Members benefit from the meetings of other affiliate organizations that convene at the same time.

International Meeting

The International Meeting is held annually outside North America. Drawing between 500 and 1000 attendees from over 40 countries, the size and varying locales of this meeting provide a unique and intimate forum for scholarly discourse across continents. The program draws attention to the regional interests of biblical scholarship, both in our host institution and as represented in the institutions of our attendees. The meeting usually takes place between the beginning of July and the middle of August.

Global Virtual Meeting

The SBL Global Virtual Meeting launched for the first time in 2023. As a meeting designed from the ground up for a virtual environment, it offers experiences, opportunities, mentoring possibilities, presentation formats, and accessibility that are not possible in an in-person meeting. This meeting typically takes place in March or April.

SBL Press

SBL Press offers a wide variety of resources for biblical studies specialists as well as students in colleges, universities, and seminaries; leaders in church and synagogue settings; and members of the general public. Books published include major reference works, commentaries, text editions and translations, scholarly monographs, tools for teaching and research, and works of general interest. In addition, SBL Press serves as the exclusive distributor of all Brown Judaic Studies titles. The *Journal of Biblical Literature* is one of the oldest and most distinguished journals in biblical scholarship, while the online *Review of Biblical Literature* offers the most comprehensive review of biblical studies publications. Finally, SBL Press also sponsors the online journal *TC: A Journal of Biblical Textual Criticism* and the Online Critical Pseudepigrapha.

PROFESSIONS

Career Resources

The Society provides resources for employment and professional development information in a variety of ways. Jobs are posted year-round at the Employment Services website: www.aarsbl.org. The society also offer helpful events such as panel reviews of pertinent topics that focus on the “how to” of the application and job-interview process as well as career paths and options for those pursuing degrees in biblical studies.

Professional Development Committee

The SBL Professional Development Committee addresses the variety of needs that arise throughout the career life cycle of all the society's members. Its major responsibilities are to:

- ✎ focus on all aspects of the career landscape and life cycle, including the ways in which our members' identities and personal lives intersect with their careers
- ✎ develop resources for members in all institutional locations
- ✎ educate members regarding professional issues, especially when new concerns arise (e.g., the rise of adjunct positions over tenure track, cultural taxation, retirement planning in a depressed economy)
- ✎ advocate with other organizations on behalf of the interests and needs of members

International Cooperation Initiative Committee

The Society's International Cooperation Initiative (ICI) was launched in 2007, and each year SBL has seen growth in participation and interest from scholars and students from all over the globe. Since the initial organizational meeting in Vienna, ICI has established an online depository of published resources available freely to anyone in ICI countries; initiated two online, open-access monograph series; set up a communications network of liaisons; sponsored a database of scholars to facilitate scholarly exchange, mentoring programs, and possibilities for collaborative teaching; provided over four hundred students and scholars in ICI countries with special rates for SBL membership; and maintained a calendar of events covering biblical studies and related conferences all over the world.

ICI Online Books

The Online Book depository now has over six hundred titles from SBL Press and our publishing partners: Brown Judaic Studies, Catholic Biblical Association, Fortress Press, Gorgias Press, Instituto Multidisciplinario de Historia y Ciencias Humanas (IMHICIHU), Sheffield Phoenix Press, Universidad Católica Argentina, Westminster John Knox, and Wiley-Blackwell.

Open-Access Monograph Series

Ancient Near East Monographs (ANEM) is a copublication effort between SBL Press and the Centro de Estudios de Historia del Antiguo Oriente at the Universidad Católica Argentina. The entire series is available online, and most titles are available through print-on-demand.

International Voices in Biblical Studies (IVBS) is guided by an editorial board of international scholars. The series is designed to provide a venue for publication and distribution of scholarly work from all areas of the world, particularly to make the excellent scholarship from underresourced areas available to the more traditional centers of biblical scholarship. The titles published to date are all available online or through print-on-demand.

ICI Liaison Network

In order to facilitate worldwide communications, the Liaison Network engages scholars in ICI countries to facilitate the two-way flow of information pertaining to SBL and global biblical scholarship. A monthly newsletter serves the ICI liaisons and other interested parties by providing updates to conferences, publications, and other SBL news.

ICI Scholarly Exchange

SBL hosts two databases that allow scholars, students, and institutions to establish contact and make arrangements for various types of scholarly exchange. Members have discovered opportunities to teach in other countries and have found creative ways to use technology in order to share teaching experiences with classrooms on other continents.

AWARDS

SBL offers the following awards. Award winners will be featured in the annual Society Report.

A. R. Pete Diamond Award for Integrative Scholarship

The A. R. Pete Diamond Award for Integrative Scholarship supports junior scholars demonstrating innovative approaches in biblical studies that advance methodological work at the intersection of historical criticism, critical theory, and cultural studies. In order to compete for the award a paper of publishable quality must be submitted. It must not have been previously published or accepted for publication; however, a paper may be submitted that is under review by a journal or other academic press if a decision to publish has not been reached at the time of submission. If the paper was delivered at an annual or international SBL meeting, it must exhibit significant revision, as demonstrated by submission of both the original draft and the revision. There is a \$1,000 monetary award.

Bernadette J. Brooten Award for Scholarship in Gender, Sexuality, and Embodiment

The primary goal for the Bernadette J. Brooten Award is to support and encourage early career researchers developing innovative approaches to the critical study of gender, sexuality, and/or embodiment in relation to biblical texts and traditions (broadly cast), especially with projects that foreground feminist, womanist, queer, and/or trans approaches.

Daniel Tran Foskett Hudgins Memorial Student Travel Award

The Daniel Tran Foskett Hudgins Memorial Student Travel Award is named in memory of Daniel Tran Foskett Hudgins, the beloved son of SBL member Mary Foskett and Scott Hudgins. In late 2021, Daniel was diagnosed with a devastating cancer. He died on 1 March 2022, at the age 21. His brief but beautiful life was characterized by love and service. As a testimony to Daniel's life and service, the Ethnic Chinese Biblical Colloquium initiated and helped establish this SBL award in his honor.

David Noel Freedman Award for Excellence and Creativity in Hebrew Bible Scholarship

The primary goal of the David Noel Freedman Award for Excellence and Creativity in Hebrew Bible Scholarship is to encourage the finest scholarship in biblical studies. In order to compete for the award a paper of publishable quality must be submitted. It must not have been previously published or accepted for publication; however, a paper may be submitted that is under review by a journal or other academic press if a decision to publish has not been reached at the time of submission. If the paper was delivered at an annual or international SBL meeting, it must exhibit significant revision, as demonstrated by submission of both the original draft and the revision. There is a \$1,000 monetary award.

Paul J. Achtemeier Award for New Testament Scholarship

The primary goal of the Paul J. Achtemeier Award for New Testament Scholarship is to stimulate the finest and most penetrating work in New Testament studies. In order to compete for the award a paper of publishable quality must be submitted. It must not have been previously published or accepted for publication; however, a paper may be submitted that is under review by a journal or other academic press if a decision to publish has not been reached at the time of submission. If the paper was delivered at an annual or international SBL meeting, it must exhibit significant revision, as demonstrated by submission of both the original draft and the revision. There is a \$1,000 monetary award.

The Richards Award for Public Scholarship

The Richards Award honors members of the Society of Biblical Literature who have demonstrated excellence in public scholarship. It seeks to recognize the powerful role of sacred texts in society and how those texts shape culture. The award is given in honor of Kent Richards and on behalf his mother, Eva Richards, who made a difference in seeking the common good, always encouraging the relevance of religion scholarship.

SBL International Travel Awards

The SBL International Travel Awards offer opportunities to current SBL members outside North America to attend the Annual or International Meeting, to participate in the program, to enhance their professional development, and to build their network with fellow scholars. These grants help facilitate the work of Program Units and the International Cooperation Initiative ("ICI"). These grants are intended to support underrepresented and underresourced scholars. As such, preference will be given to women, people of historically underrepresented ethnicities, and members from ICI-qualifying countries. A key criterion is an applicant's demonstrable financial need.

Four International Travel Award Panels (ITAP) administer the awards each year, serving four geographic regions:

- ☞ Africa and Middle East
- ☞ Asia and Pacific
- ☞ Eastern Europe
- ☞ Latin America and Caribbean

Each ITAP administers \$3,000 in awards in each region.

Society of Biblical Literature — De Gruyter Prize for Biblical Studies and Reception History

The De Gruyter Prize for Biblical Studies and Reception History promotes the study of the reception history of the Bible and aims to highlight the broad impact of the Bible in a wide variety of historical contexts and cultural settings. SBL is grateful to De Gruyter for investing in this growing area of research and teaching, one that also cultivates interdisciplinary studies in the humanities.

Beginning in 2020, the award will be for papers in two categories: Textual Culture and Reception of the Bible, and Material and Visual Culture and Reception of the Bible. De Gruyter will support each category with an annual cash prize of \$750. The awarded papers will be published in the *Journal of the Bible and its Reception*. In addition to being published, the awarded papers will be delivered at the SBL Annual Meeting followed by a panel discussion.

Status of Women in the Profession Committee Mentor Award

Each year at the SBL Annual Meeting, CSWP honors women who have been excellent mentors to women in the field. These mentors have provided invaluable guidance, advice, and encouragement. They serve as role models and assist other women in navigating career choices, building professional networks, and developing strategies for work-life balance. CSWP honors mentors in order to recognize their contributions and to encourage mentoring relationships. If you would like to nominate a mentor, please send your nomination with a descriptive letter of endorsement to the chairs of the committee. Nominations must be received by May 1st. Nominations received after the deadline will be considered for the following year.

The Underrepresented Racial and Ethnic Minorities in the Profession Committee's Outstanding Mentor Award

Many biblical scholars of color provide exceptional mentoring service to other scholars of color in the context of doctoral programs and/or in less formal but significant ways. They provide invaluable advice at various stages of one's career, help develop important networks, offer support in the process of navigating intricacies of the guild, and serve as role models. CUREMP seeks to honor such outstanding mentors

If you wish to nominate someone for this award, please send their name along with a letter of nomination to the chair of the committee. The letter should describe the ways the nominee helped your professional advancement and why you think the nominee stands out as an exceptional mentor. You are welcome to nominate your current or former doctoral advisor or someone who has mentored you in less formal ways. Anyone can nominate but the nominees should have been scholars/faculty members at the time of mentoring. The committee might supplement nominations from its historic and ongoing work as needed. Deadline is July 31. Nominations received after the deadline will be considered for the following year.

SBL PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT POLICY

The members of the SBL constitute a community of scholars dedicated to promoting the critical investigation of biblical literature and history, together with other related literature, by the exchange of scholarly research in published form and in public forum.

While freedom of inquiry is at the heart of this enterprise, such freedom carries with it the responsibility of professional conduct. As a learned society, the SBL requires professional conduct of its members as they exchange scholarly research in SBL publications and when they convene at SBL meetings and programs.

Professional conduct includes, but is not limited to, conduct based on respect for others which does not in any way exploit power and/or status differences such as those that exist between faculty and students, between senior and junior colleagues, between employers and those seeking employment, or between those who grant access to publication or presentation and those who seek such access. It also includes conduct based on respect in peer to peer relationships. Professional conduct is free of all forms of harassment and discrimination.

Discrimination means a distinction, whether intentional or not, relating to personal characteristics of an individual or group, which has the effect of imposing burdens, obligations, or disadvantages on such individual or group not imposed on others; or which withholds or limits access to opportunities, benefits and advantages available to other members of the SBL. Discrimination on the basis of race, ancestry, place of origin, color, ethnic group, citizenship, gender identity, sexual orientation, disability, creed, age, marital/family status, or any other characteristic protected by U.S. law is prohibited by SBL in all of its sanctioned activities (including regional, annual, and international meetings, sponsored events and programmatic activities, and committee and editorial board meetings).

Harassment may be defined as vexatious comment or conduct in relation to a person or group of persons on the basis of personal characteristics (i) which has the effect or purpose of creating a hostile or intimidating environment; or (ii) which has the effect or purpose of offending or demeaning a person or group of persons; or (iii) which functions implicitly or explicitly to limit participation in a professional program, activity, or opportunity.

Sexual harassment includes unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal comment or physical conduct of a sexual nature by a person who knows or ought reasonably to know that such conduct is unwanted, including situations in which (i) the request or conduct involves any implied or expressed promise of professional reward for complying; or (ii) the request or conduct involves any implied or expressed threat of reprisal or denial of opportunity for refusing to comply; or (iii) the request or conduct results in what reasonably may be perceived as a hostile or intimidating environment. Such examples are illustrative, not exhaustive. Sexual harassment does not refer to occasional compliments of a socially acceptable nature or consensual personal and social relationships without a discriminatory effect. It refers to behavior that reasonably situated persons would regard as not welcome and as personally intimidating, hostile, or offensive.

The SBL is committed to the creation and maintenance of a discrimination- and harassment-free environment in all of its sanctioned activities. The professional conduct of all members who participate in such activities is essential for preserving this standard. SBL is also committed to preventing harassment by or toward its employees and third parties involved in its activities, including contractors, vendors, volunteers, or guests.

Any person who has experienced a serious verbal threat or any physical assault should contact law enforcement officials immediately. Any person who desires to report a possible violation of the SBL Professional Conduct Policy at an SBL sanctioned event should promptly contact the SBL Executive Director, the Chair of SBL Council, or the Professional Conduct Committee Chair. SBL has established Professional Conduct Investigation Procedures that provide guidelines for gathering information, maintaining confidentiality to the extent possible, reaching an initial determination, allowing for an appeal, and determining disciplinary action.

SBL cannot proceed with an investigation of anonymous complaints. However, SBL honors the confidentiality of conversations within the parameters of the law and will reasonably act to protect persons participating in a complaint process. Members who have witnessed an alleged incident of harassment or discrimination are encouraged to report the incident. However, an investigation may not be conducted without the consent and participation of the alleged victim.

SBL will investigate all complaints according to its Procedures. The existence of a law enforcement complaint is extremely helpful to the Professional Conduct investigation process. No individual will be retaliated against for making a complaint in good faith or assisting with the investigation of a complaint.

Anyone who is found to have engaged in discrimination or any form of harassment will be subject to disciplinary action, which may include, but is not limited to, reprimand and/or suspension or termination of the individual's membership and/or participation in current or future SBL operated, sponsored or affiliated events. If an individual in attendance at an SBL-sanctioned event is found to have violated the Professional Conduct Policy with respect to sexual harassment or assault, SBL may revoke that individual's permission to be on the premises, with the individual's registration fees forfeited. An SBL member who is found to be in violation of the SBL Professional Conduct Policy may be denied registration or participation in a meeting, service on boards and committees, and/or participation in SBL publishing programs. Severe or repeated violation of the Professional Conduct Policy may result in revocation of SBL membership.

Individuals who are publicly sanctioned for sexual assault, harassment, or other kinds of misconduct by an institution, including by a university or corporation, may be barred from participating in SBL-sanctioned events for the duration of the institution's sanction or have their membership terminated. Appeals may be requested in the case of advance registration for the Annual and International Meetings; on-site registration for such individuals will not be permitted.

SBL stands in solidarity with persons who have experienced harassment or assault. Members working in the United States may also have the right to bring complaint to their respective institutions, following Title IX rules and regulations.

This policy was approved by the SBL Council October 2019 and updated by the SBL Council April 2023.

Behold the Global Bibles! Research and Pedagogical Implications

Musa W. Dube, William Ragsdale Cannon Distinguished Prof of the New Testament, Candler School of Theology, Emory University



Musa W. Dube was born in Botswana to Zimbabwean diasporian parents. Her parents relocated to Botswana in 1958 after black Zimbabwean populations were disposed of their lands and resettled in reserves by settler colonizers. Dube was thus born and raised in Botswana in a family that held great reverence for the land, given their traumatic experience. Dube thus grew up in a context that was highly charged with political movements of agitating for independence from colonial forces. With a mother who was deeply religious and dedicated to reading her Bible, she specialized in environmental science and theology for her first degree. Dube's family and African experience of colonialism has greatly shaped her scholarship. Her research, writing, publication and activism focus on the areas of postcolonialism, religion, translation, gender, pandemics, critical thinking and theorizing indigenous knowledges.

Dube's academic career began formerly in 1988 when she completed her first degree at the University of Botswana. The University had a program of identifying its best students for further development. She was thus recruited as a staff development fellow for the area of biblical studies, New Testament. Thereafter the University of Botswana sent her for postgraduate studies; first, to the University of Durham in UK for her Masters (1989–90); second, to Vanderbilt University in the USA for her PhD (1992–1997). Upon completion of her postgraduate training, Dube returned to the University of Botswana as a lecturer in New Testament studies. From 2002–05, she took unpaid leave and worked for the World Council of Churches (WCC) Africa region and for Scripps College in Claremont Colleges, California. She served the WCC as a trainer of trainers, for mainstreaming HIV&AIDS and gender for faith-based organizations (FBOs) and academic theological departments. In Scripps College Dube was an assistant professor of the New Testament and the head of department, coordinating the religion program with the four other Claremont colleges (Pomona, Pitzer, Claremont McKenna, and Claremont Graduate School). In 2005, she resumed her position at the University of Botswana, only briefly leaving for sabbatical leave in Union Theological Seminary, New York and University of Bamberg, Germany. In July 2021, Dube relocated to Candler School of Theology, where she is currently located as the William Ragsdale Cannon Distinguished Professor of the New Testament.

As a socially engaged scholar, providing academic leadership has been a major focus of her career. This involved working with various scholars, teams and associations and mentoring to increase academic productivity and visibility of African scholars, as well as challenging the latter to generate relevant scholarship. During her international graduate training, Dube realized that African male and women's voices were missing in the academic biblical studies and resolved to make a difference through her work and mobilizing others to do the same. First, she operated through the SBL and the Circle of Concerned African Women Theologians (henceforth the Circle), a Pan-African academic association that has about 700 members. From 1997 to 2002 Dube served as a research director of biblical studies of the Circle, charged with identifying researchable themes, writing a call for papers and overseeing the whole process of receiving and editing papers as well as identifying potential publishers. This period produced volumes such as *Other Ways of Reading: African Women and the Bible* (2001); *Talitha Cum: Theologies of African Women* (with Nyambura Njoroge; 2001); *Grant Me Justice: HIV/AIDS and Gender Readings of the Bible* (with Musimbi Kanyoro; 2004). In 2019 Dube was elected as the Africa-wide coordinator of the Circle of Concerned African Women Theologians, a position she will hold till 2024. The association has since then focused its research on issues of climate change, global warming and their intersection with gender. Some of its research output include *Mother Earth, Mother Africa and Biblical Interpretation* (2021); *African Literature, Mother Earth and Religion* (2022), among others.

Dube first joined SBL in the early 1990s, becoming actively engaged with the Bible in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean and Latin America unit (1995–2001), Committee on the Status of Women in the Profession; Committee for Underrepresented Racial and Ethnic Minorities in the Profession; Johannine Literature section (2000–2002), Academic Teaching of the Bible section (2001–2003), and Ideological Criticism section (1995–2001). Dube went on to serve as an editorial board member of the *Semeia* journal and the associated *Semeia* Studies book series (2000–2006); an editorial board member of the *International Voices in Biblical Studies* book series (2017–22); SBL Vice President (2022) and SBL Council member (2022–2023). In 2011 the Committee on the Status of Women in the Profession awarded her their SBL Mentor Award. From 2005 to 2009 Dube was the program unit chair for African Biblical Hermeneutics, a role she passionately held to support and highlight the work of African biblical scholars.

Her role was to coordinate the process of running sessions on African Biblical Hermeneutics for SBL, which entailed identifying the themes of research with African scholars, writing a call for papers, recruiting presenters, drawing the program, overseeing the actual presentations and business meetings and coordinating publication of proceedings. This academic leadership culminated in the collection of papers presented during this period into the co-edited volume *Postcolonial Perspectives in African Biblical Interpretations* (2012), co-edited with Andrew Mbuvi and Dora Mbuwayesango. In line with supporting and highlighting the work of African biblical scholars Dube has also co-edited (with Gerald West) *The Bible in Africa: Transactions, Trajectories and Trends* (2000); and *Semeia 73: "Reading With": An Exploration of the Interface between Critical and Ordinary Readings of the Bible* (1997) among other volumes.

By far Dube's career was challenged and expanded by the HIV&AIDS epidemic of the late 1990s to early 2000s. With the epidemic at its height, death and suffering reigning supreme and FBOs and the academy either silent or speaking unconstructively and inadequately, Dube began to ask how her teaching and research could be part of the solution and how she could mobilize others to respond constructively. Her first move was to produce a teaching tool for FBOs on the plight of orphaned children by producing a documentary video in Setswana and English. This was followed by mainstreaming HIV&AIDS in her teaching, research, public lectures and motivating her colleagues to do likewise through seminars. The innovative steps she undertook led the WCC (based in Geneva) to ask her to take up the position of mobilizing and training African scholars of religion and FBOs to mainstream HIV&AIDS in their programs (2002–2005) and to produce relevant materials—continent-wide. This led her to take unpaid leave from the University of Botswana. The job involved organizing training of trainers' workshops regionally and then nationally and bringing academic and faith leaders to review their prevailing programs for either mainstreaming HIV&AIDS in the existing courses/programs or creating entirely new ones or both; and encouraging leaders to adopt HIV&AIDS policies for their institutions. It also involved training/educating FBO boards in the continent and worldwide on adopting HIV&AIDS policies for their communities and mainstreaming HIV&AIDS in their programs. An important part of this work involved training FBOs to go beyond individual morality to embracing political, social, and economic issues in their response to HIV&AIDS. It was in this area of engagement that Dube was challenged to expand her conversation and collaborative partners beyond the academia to include faith-based communities, non-governmental organizations, UN agencies, community-based organizations, and other stakeholders.

It was also in this area where Dube became directly involved in curriculum transformation, program formulation, strategic planning and budget management. Some of the resources produced during this engagement include *HIV/AIDS and the Curriculum: Methods of Integrating HIV/AIDS in Theological Education* (2003); *AfricaPraying: A Handbook of HIV/AIDS Sensitive Sermons and Liturgy* (2003); *The HIV and AIDS Bible: Some Selected Essays* (2008) and *Reading the New Testament in the HIV&AIDS Contexts* (2008).



In sum, Dube's academic career has been informed and characterized by activism, decolonization, team building, curriculum transformation, coordination, leadership, mentoring, training of trainers, workshop facilitation, massive research, writing and worldwide public speaking engagements. Altogether Dube has produced books, anthologies, book chapters, articles, creative work which is in the range of 300 pieces. The impact of her work is well attested on various fronts, such as: the number of edited journal volumes and anthologies, the number of her individually produced publications; the number of prestigious lectures and keynote addresses given in more than thirty countries in the world; board membership in various refereed journals; various electronic engines. It can also be measured by courses, programs and Centers on HIV&AIDS that have been established in various theological institutions in the continent. The impact of Dube's work is also attested by the number and quality of awards received: six from the University of Botswana and nine from international organizations and institutions. Accordingly, in 2011 Dube was awarded Friedrich Wilhelm Research Award, awarded by the Humboldt Foundation, and in 2017 the Gutenberg Teaching Award, awarded by University of Gutenberg, Mainz, Germany.

Theme: Biblical Violence

The Biblical Violence Research Group is for those working on the hermeneutics of biblical violence in both testaments. Biblical violence can be found within every genre of the Bible and is not a homogeneous entity. It is variously condemned, described, implored, threatened, endorsed, or commanded. Biblical violence may be interpersonal, societal, or international. It may be military, sexual, or structural. It can be historical, mythological, and eschatological. There are many unanswered questions that fall within this broad theme, and at times they present enormous pastoral and even missional problems to the church. Further rigorous, confessional scholarship is imperative. For all these reasons, a wide variety of hermeneutical approaches to a wide range of texts is needed. This group's engagement with biblical books provides a forum for specific, focused conversation and collaboration on the hermeneutics of violence which transcends a focus on any one book or corpus and dialogues across genres and testaments. Our 2023 session begins a new three-year cycle, with each year focusing on a specific text of biblical violence from diverse hermeneutical approaches. Theme: Biblical Lexicography from a Cognitive Linguistic Perspective

Biblical Hebrew lexicography has always been hindered by the fact that this is an ancient language with a limited corpus of available text. As a result, biblical lexicographers tend to lean heavily on etymology and philology, in spite of the intrinsic weaknesses of this methodology.

The advent of cognitive linguistics has brought new perspectives, the first and foremost being that, even though we tend to say that words have meanings, it is actually more correct to say that meanings have words.

Another important insight is that meaning can have structure. When talking about linguistic structure we are inclined to think of fields such as phonology, morphology, and syntax, but cognitive linguistics teaches us that meaning is structured as well.

In this interactive workshop, editor-in-chief of the Semantic Dictionary of Biblical Hebrew, Reinier de Blois, will lead us in discovering together how meaning is structured in Biblical Hebrew and how this structure can help us get a more profound understanding of the meaning behind certain difficult Biblical terms. Students and scholars of the Greek New Testament are also welcome to gain cognitive insights into biblical lexicography.

2023 Israel and the Church: Complement, Fulfillment or Replacement? The focus of our second IBR session will be the relationship between Israel and the Church. New Testament authors grappled with the relationship between Jacob's descendants and the community of Jesus' followers, as did their earliest interpreters. Post-Holocaust Biblical scholarship continues to reckon with the Church's long history of anti-Judaism, supersessionism, and Christian antisemitism, as scholars continue to debate the central biblical texts and themes relevant to understanding the relationship between ethnic Israel and the Church.

Among the questions panelists will address are these:

Did NT authors view the increasingly Gentile church as Abraham's offspring?

Did they see Gentiles in Christ as incorporated into Israel and heirs to covenantal promises?

Do some NT texts suggest the Church "completes," "fulfills" and/or "supersedes" the Jews in God's plan?

Did NT authors espouse Jewish restoration nationalism?

Did NT authors reserve some covenant blessings (e.g., possessing the Land) for ethnic Israel apart from Jesus' community?

What role or benefits, if any, does Israel have today in light of promises made to her in the OT?

How do various construals of the church's relationship to Israel influence contemporary Christian assessments of modern Israel and its territorial claims in the Holy Land?

In "Archive Fever," Jacques Derrida asks: "How does one prove in general an absence of archive, if not in relying on classical norms (presence/absence of literal and explicit references to this or to that, to a this or to a that which one supposes to be identical to themselves, and simply absent, actually absent, if they are not simply present, actually present?" For the 2023 annual meeting, Philology in Hebrew Studies will consider the theme of "Archival Absences." Why do biblical texts and many Second Temple texts demonstrate a knowledge of prior texts but avoid direct reference to them? Even when texts, such as the Pentateuch, seem to be in view in one form or another, how are we to explain the noted inexactitude of their citation? What sort of understanding of what a text is does such reticence entail? How is textual knowledge represented in biblical texts? As a practical matter, in the absence of explicit treatment, how are we to determine the presence of earlier texts in later ones? You Can't Always Get What You Want: Subordinate Masculinities In 1 Kings 21 (30 min)

Samuel and Kings are rife with narratives predicting and describing the abuses of coercive political power—including the illicit appropriation of property and people (2 Sam 11; 1 Kgs 11; 21), the appropriation of women's bodies (2 Sam 3, 11, 13), the instrumentalization of foreigners and non-majority ethnic groups (2 Sam 18, 21), and extrajudicial execution (2 Sam 11)—all in the service of gratifying the ruler's desires and consolidating or maintaining political power. In many (but not all) of these episodes, a prophet intervenes to pronounce judgment on the dynasty. The biblical text's preservation of the pattern of political offense and prophetic judgment, or lack thereof, raises the question of how this motif should be interpreted—and what moral authority it commands—in modern North and South American contexts. The Deuteronomistic History and Latino/a/x and Latin American Biblical Interpretation sections invite papers exploring the biblical response to state or nation-sanctioned violence in Samuel and Kings and the narrators' (/authors'/narrators') critique of that coercion. Potential topics for exploration include: literary, theological, feminist, womanist, postcolonial, decolonial, psychoanalytical, sociological, linguistic, text- and source-critical, philological, or other theoretical or methodological approaches to these stories with the goal of elucidating the historical lessons to be learned from them; hermeneutic-theoretical reflections on whether, how, and when to apply such insights to modern contexts; and the authority and responsibility of contemporary religious communities to make pronouncements in American society on the basis of biblical texts.

The session will review Jason Staples' forthcoming book, *Paul and the Resurrection of Israel: Jews, Former Gentiles, and Israelites* (Cambridge University Press). Staples' book traces Paul's inclusive theology to a hidden strand of thinking in the earlier Jewish story. Staples argues that postexilic southern Judah maintained a notion of "Israel" as both a reference to the north and the ongoing reality of a broad, pan-Israelite sensibility to which the descendants of both ancient kingdoms belonged. Paul's concomitant belief was that Israel's exile meant assimilation among the nations – effectively a people's death – and that its restoration paradoxically required Gentile inclusion to resurrect a greater "Israel" from the dead.

Mediation and the Immediate God: Scriptures, the Church, and Knowing God (St. Vladimir's Seminary Press, 2023) pursues a long-standing question: how can Christians say both that God has a direct relationship with each worshipper, and that mediation obtains in the Christian household? This study explores the ubiquity of mediation in life, alongside the apparent contradiction in Christian thought that each believer is directly "taught by God," while human mediators continue to serve. As an invitation to Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, and Protestant Christians to engage this issue together, the book suggests, as a starting point, that mediation should be understood primarily in terms of ecclesiology rather than soteriology proper. A careful analysis of 1 Timothy 2 shows that what has been taken as a restriction of mediation to the God-Man is actually contextualized within an affirmation that mediation is a characteristic of the Church. Close readings of other pertinent Scripture follow, with special attention to the interpretation of ancient theologians. Two surprising aspects of this study include the prominence of mediating women in Matthew's gospel and the recognition that, in the Christian tradition, mediation comes not only from "above" humanity (the angelic hosts), but also from "below" (the inanimate creation).

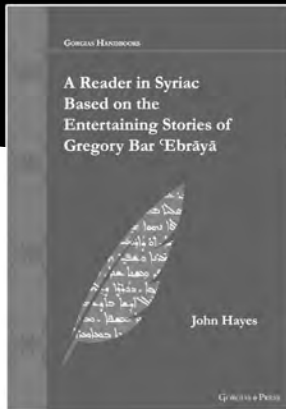
Luke’s Rhetorical Compositions offers new ideas in Lukan scholarship, especially regarding Aelius Theon’s first-century rhetoric manual *Progymnasmata* and inter-textual Lukan-Pauline biblical studies. Two chapters deserve special mention: the material in chapter 3 is a groundbreaking discussion of Acts 2:38 in which its Greek verb tense speaks to the subsequent reception of the gift of the Holy Spirit following salvation, not coincident with salvation. In Acts 2:38 it is Luke’s intention to portray Peter as promising the gift of the Holy Spirit to hearers and to those beyond narrative time as a Pentecostal experience.

Chapter 9 discusses Luke’s use of progymnasmatic examples in his descriptions of the salvation experience. It also discusses Luke’s clarification of Paul using narrative persuasion from Jesus tradition and history. Also, Luke’s use of basic soteriological vocabulary provides clarity and plausibility. His distinctive selection of examples from the Jesus tradition and his duplication of Paul’s soteriological vocabulary is very helpful.

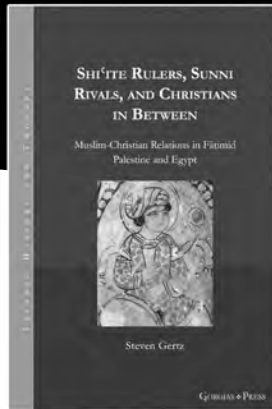
